KHC/CERRU UNDOING BIAS FELLOWSHIP (Applications due December 8)

Are you committed to learning how to confront the challenges of a diverse world?

KHC/CERRU Fellows will learn how to have difficult conversations and how to transform conflict into learning. Fellows will learn and practice the following skills:

- How to have difficult interpersonal conversations
- How to have difficult conversations regarding sociocultural differences
- How to explore social identity
- How to transform conflict
- How to articulate your own values and construct a narrative of self

NATIONAL ENDOWMENT FOR THE HUMANITIES: COMPLICITY & COLLABORATION DURING THE HOLOCAUST

What role did regular citizens played in enabling the atrocities of the Holocaust to occur? Why didn't more bystanders engage in active helping of Jews or stage resistance or rescue efforts?

Students will explore the psychology of bystander behavior during the Holocaust. For example, complicity (guilt or responsibility by inaction) versus collaboration (actively participating with the Nazi regime) will be a core feature of reflection. Social psychological theories and principles will be applied to help in understanding bystander, perpetrator and rescue/resistance behaviors. Fellows will be required to attend all four events in the Spring 2017 KHC/NEH Colloquium: Complicity & Collaboration.
